

FHA Delegates From 15 Counties At Meeting Here

Fifteen Western North Carolina counties were represented at a Farmers Home Administration county committee training meeting held at the courthouse Wednesday.

George Cash, area supervisor, conducted the meeting. Principal speaker was Horace J. Isenhour of Raleigh, state director of the FHA, who gave a brief history of the Farmers Home Demonstration. Three other state FHA officials attended the session and instructed the county committeemen on their duties.

The major role of the county committees, it was explained, is to take action on loan applications made through the agency.

Umstead Park To Be Dedicated On Sunday Afternoon

Sunday, August 28, has been proclaimed by Gov. Hodges and the mayors of Durham and Raleigh as "William B. Umstead State Park Day."

In a joint proclamation, the Governor and Mayors E. J. Evans of Durham and Fred B. Wheeler of Raleigh urged all citizens of the State to observe the day by attending the dedication on that date at 5 p. m. at the park site of the William B. Umstead Park, formerly known as the Crabtree Creek State Park. The park is located about midway between Durham and Raleigh on Highway 70.

The name of the park was changed by the State Board of Conservation and Development to honor the memory of the late Gov. Umstead, who died last November.

Gov. Hodges will make the dedicatory address. The response will be by Mrs. Merle D. Umstead of Durham, widow of the late Governor. Merle Bradley Umstead, daughter and only child of Mr. Umstead, will unveil a marker to the park entrance.


