Determined Mountaineers Victorious Over Sylva In Season's Opener, 32-6

The Waynesville Mountaineers pushed over five touchdowns and two extra points against the Sylva Golden Hurricanes Friday night to open the season for the local gridder. Sylva scored in the last quarter on a 55-yard run by Shannon.

The foggy night and damp field saw both teams sticking to the grounds, as Waynesville only tried three passes during the evening, one which added six points to the score.

The first break in the game came when Sylva fumbled after being unable to penetrate the Mountaineer line. The loose ball was recovered by several Waynesville players. The Mountaineer resorted to line plays and five plays later were over the goal with Jordan carrying the ball. Grasty ran the ball over for the extra point.

Waynesville kicked to Sylva, and in short order Sylva was forced to kick, with the ball going to the 15 yard line. Mountaineer Hooper tucked the ball under his arm on the second play and on a wide swing around left end ran 85 yards for the second score of the game. The extra point failed.

The next series of plays followed much the same pattern of the second score, with Waynesville yanking to Sylva and then holding for downs. On the third down for the Mountaineers, Jordan faded back and shot a spiraling pass out in the flat to Stephens who scampered 60 yards, with good down-field blocking, for the third score. Grasty again ran the fall over for the extra point, giving Waynesville a 20-0 score at the half.

Sylva kicked to Waynesville to begin the third quarter and Jordan, Hooper and Stephens alternated in making sizeable gains with Jordan going over from the 12 for another tally.

The third quarter was three minutes old when Coaches C. E. Weatherby and Bruce Jaynes sent in the second squad of the Mountaineers. Waynesville kicked to Sylva and then held the Hurricanes for downs. The Mountaineer second unit backs carried the ball down to the five where Neal Palmer went over for the sixth score of the evening for the Waynesville team. In setting up the sixth score, the consistent gains by Lane and Rowland were outstanding; Lane carried for a 20-yard gain in one

hard-plugging run. With the score 32 to 9, the Waynesville coaches sent in the third unit of the squad as the fourth quarter began.

Shannon, a feet-footed Sylva back, went around the left side for a 55-yard sprint and across the goal for Sylva's lone tally of the evening.

Mountaineer linemen who played excellent ball included Bruce Davis, Harold Clark, Tony Davis, Jim Hall, Jim Byrd, and David Kelley, while the backs included Stephens, Gaddis, Hooper, Grasty, Jordan, Lane and Palmer.

Sylva's defensive standouts included Charles Mason, Bobby Holden and Walter Henson, while Kirk Shannon and Tommy Mason were leaders in the offensive roles.
