### Dr. Matthews Addresses Canton PTA

Dr. Hugh A. Matthews, Canton physician, spoke on "Accidents in Childhood" at the September meeting of the Pennsylvania Avenue P.T.A.

Dr. Matthews urged parents to check their own homes in order to eradicate accident hazards. He suggested that stairways, walkways, and yards be cleared, and that medicine cabinets be checked. He stated that thought should be given to proper lighting, and that milk bottles should be placed in containers and not left carelessly on door steps.

"From the ages of 1 to 14 years, accidents kill more children than all known childhood diseases," Dr. Matthews stated. He cited several accident case histories, and urged parents to use common sense to avoid accidents.

In closing Dr. Matthews said, "The life you save may be that of your own child."

The devotion was led by Jack Medford, educational director of the First Baptist Church.

The group will discuss the district meeting which held here October 22.

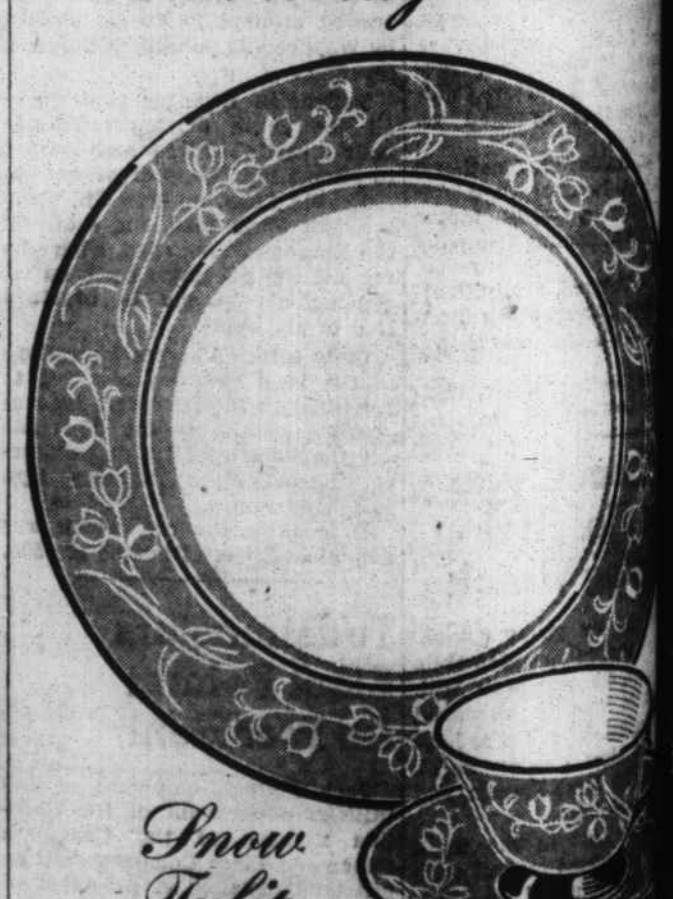
