Senator Smathers Raps Policy Of Administration

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Senator George Smathers (D-Fla.) criticized the Eisenhower administration and Agriculture Secretary Ez-

ra Taft Benson for not being "sufficiently concerned" with the economic plight of the nation's farmers.

"The farmers' plight is the number one problem in the nation, it has to be solved early next year, or we're in bad shape," Smathers said in an interview. Smathers said the Republican

administration cannot be blamed entirely for the drop in farm income, "but I don't think Agriculture Secretary Benson or the administration have been sufficiently concerned with finding a solution to the problem."
"The farmer is the one person in our economic cycle who is suffering today," Smathers said. "I'm sure there is no push button answer to the farmer's plight, but it is so serious . . . we can't ignore

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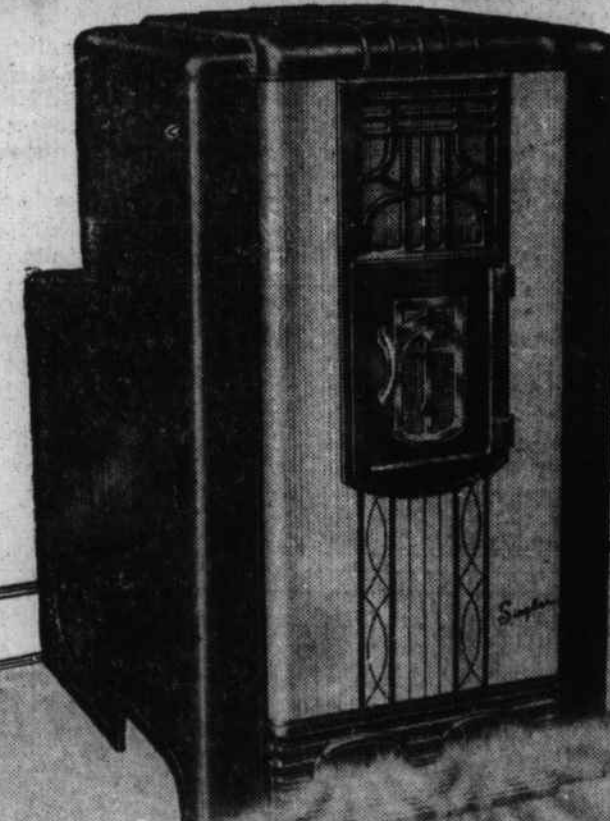
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
