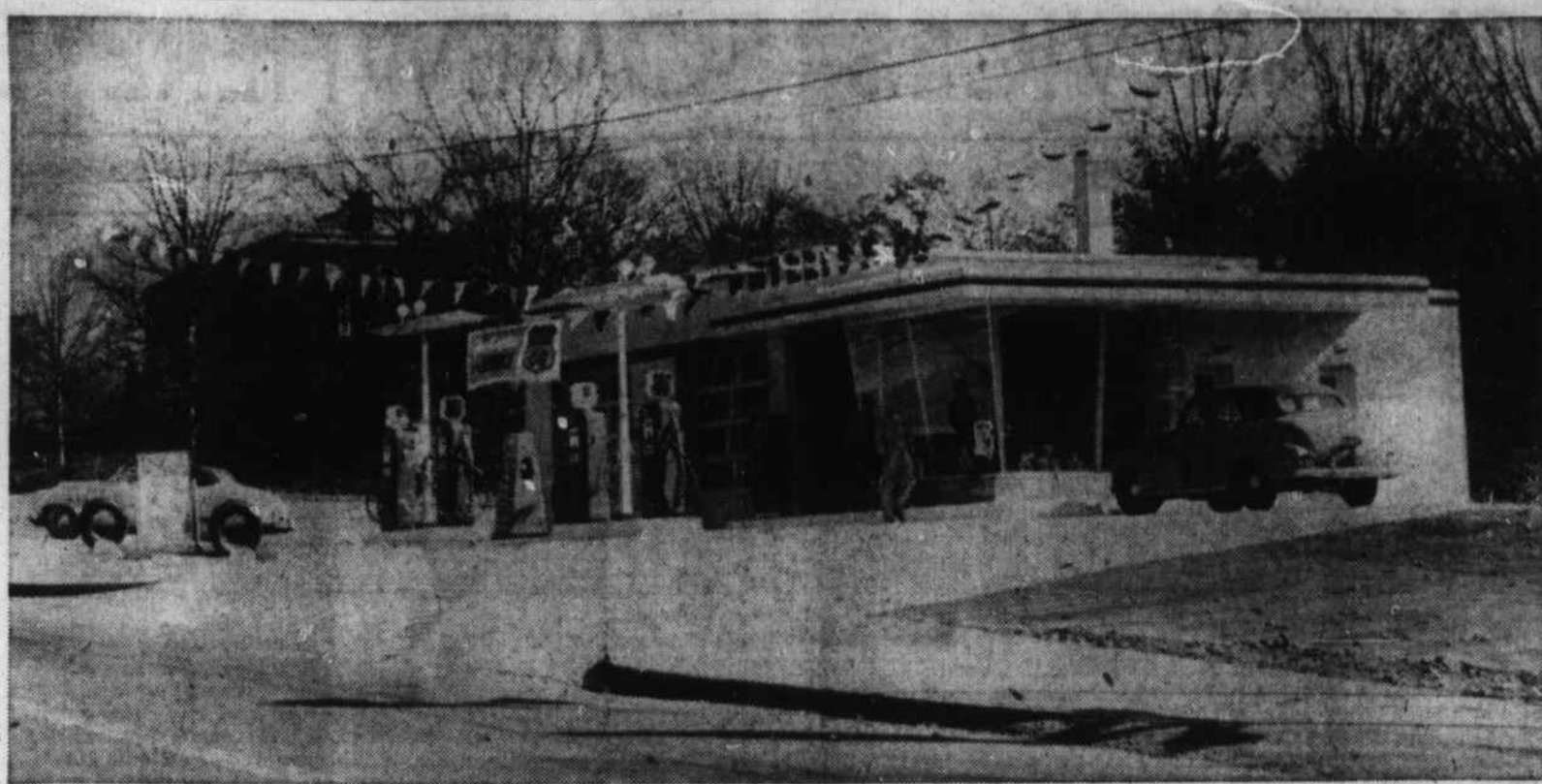
Also Canton fans are proud of Charlie Carpenter and his excellent football record this year at Wake Forest.
