

Fishing To Open Tuesday In Smoky Mountains Park

Fishing will open in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park and continue through August 31, it has been announced.

The following regulations apply to fishing in the park:

All park waters are open to fishing except the following: North Carolina; Lands Creek; Mingo Creek; Chestnut Branch; that part of Raven Fork and all tributaries thereof lying upstream from the Cherokee Indian Reservation boundary at Big Cove, Tennessee; All waters of the Middle Prong of Little Pigeon River above the mouth of Ramsey Prong except the waters of Ramsey Prong.

No fish caught in the waters of Bradley Fork in North Carolina nor in the waters of the West Prong of Little Pigeon River in Tennessee shall be retained but each fish caught in these waters shall be carefully handled with moist hands and returned at once to the water.

Fishing is permitted with only artificial flies or lures with one hook. The possession of minnows or other bait fish or use thereof as bait, or placing of food in any waters for attracting fish is prohibited.

No fish less than seven inches in length may be retained. All fish

caught less than seven inches in length shall be carefully handled with moist hands and returned at once to the water.

The maximum catch in any one day and the maximum number of trout in possession shall be 5. Maximum catch in any one day and maximum number of bass in possession shall be 5. Maximum creel of trout and bass together shall not exceed 5 fish in one day or 5 fish in possession at any time. There is no creel limit on other species.

The National Park Service makes no charge for fishing but persons fishing within the park must procure the resident or non-resident state license issued and required by Tennessee or the resident or non-resident state or county license or permit issued and required by North Carolina.

The possessor of a resident fishing license issued by the State of North Carolina shall not fish on the Tennessee side of the park without first having obtained a fishing license issued by the State of Tennessee, and the possessor of a resident fishing license issued by the State of Tennessee shall not fish on the North Carolina side of the park without first having obtained a fishing license issued by the State of North Carolina. The possessor of a non-resident license issued by the State of Tennessee or by the State of North Carolina may fish throughout the park during the open season.

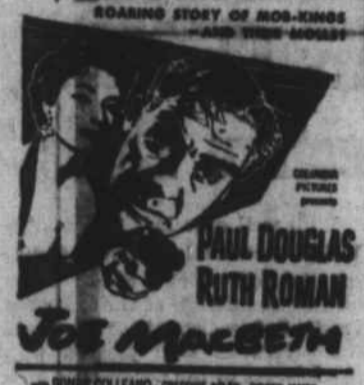

Behind 4-1 going into the seventh inning, Erwin High of Buncombe County pushed across three runs in that inning and extended the game into the ninth inning to win over Waynesville here Friday afternoon, 5-4.

Waynesville scored one run in the first inning on doubles by Ezell and Ballance, and two more in the second as Eyrd was hit by a pitch, Mitchell tripled, scoring Eyrd, and Davis singled, scoring Mitchell.

The Mountaineers added a fourth run in the fifth inning as Holder walked, and Hill and Carver singled, scoring Holder.

Erwin scored its first run in the fifth on two errors and a single by Coxie.

In the seventh inning, Smith singled for Erwin, Cowan hit to the pitcher, but Mitchell over-threw second base and tossed the ball into center field. Herron walked, Coxie struck out, and Rhymer walked, forcing Smith in. Ballance then relieved Mitchell for Waynesville, and struck out Dover.
