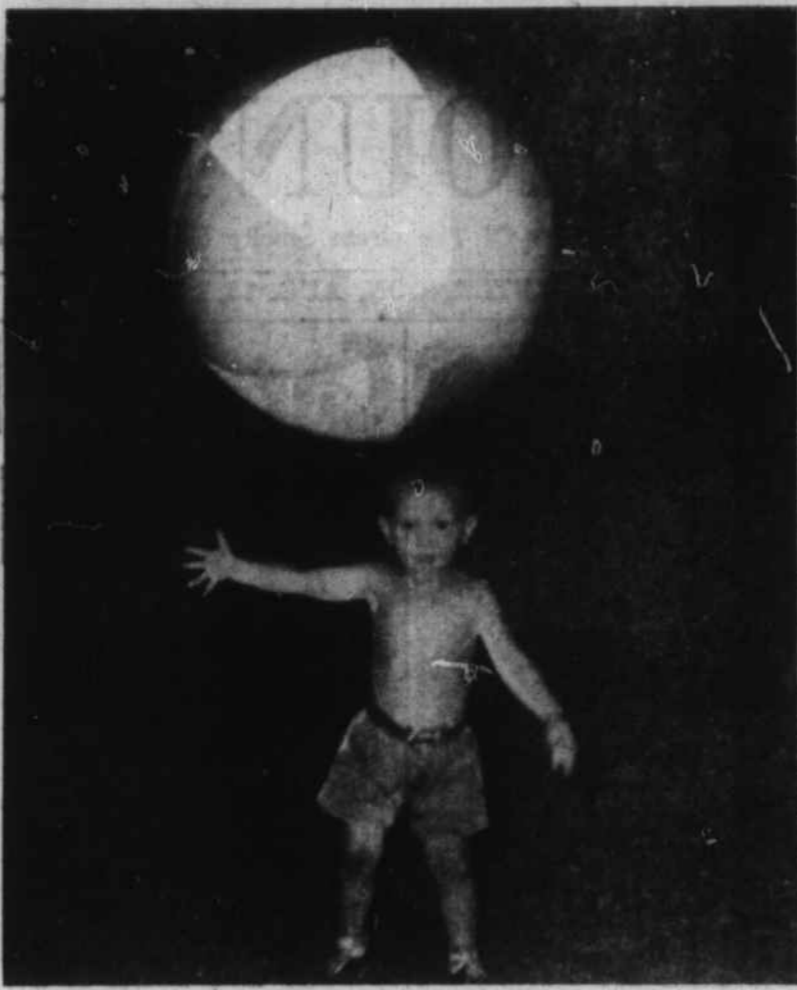


Notice Of Tax Sale

Conference Gets First-Hand View Of Lord's Acre Plan

Members of the Town and Country conference in session at Lake Junaluska visited Elizabeth Chapel, Ratcliffe Cove, Saturday noon for lunch and a first-hand account of a Lord's Acre Project of the rural church. The group, led by Dr. James Sells, director, heard members of the church, including Mrs. James Medford, president of the WSCS; Hugh Ratcliffe, owner of the land; and two young people, Milas Kirkpatrick and Barbara Stone, explain various projects which have meant nice returns for the church treasury. They were presented by the Rev. Grady Barringer, pastor of the church. One of the projects staged by the women was a "dollar talent" program in which each member received one dollar to reinvest and turned all proceeds back to the church treasury. This netted enough to pay off the indebtedness on the church kitchen and dining room, where some 60 were served a bountiful dinner on Saturday. The half acre of spring onions planted last year netted the church \$160 and they expect \$100 for this year's planting.
