Teague Williams, cousin of the bridegroom, served as best man and ushers were Paul Frye, brother of the bride, and Ralph Kurfies.

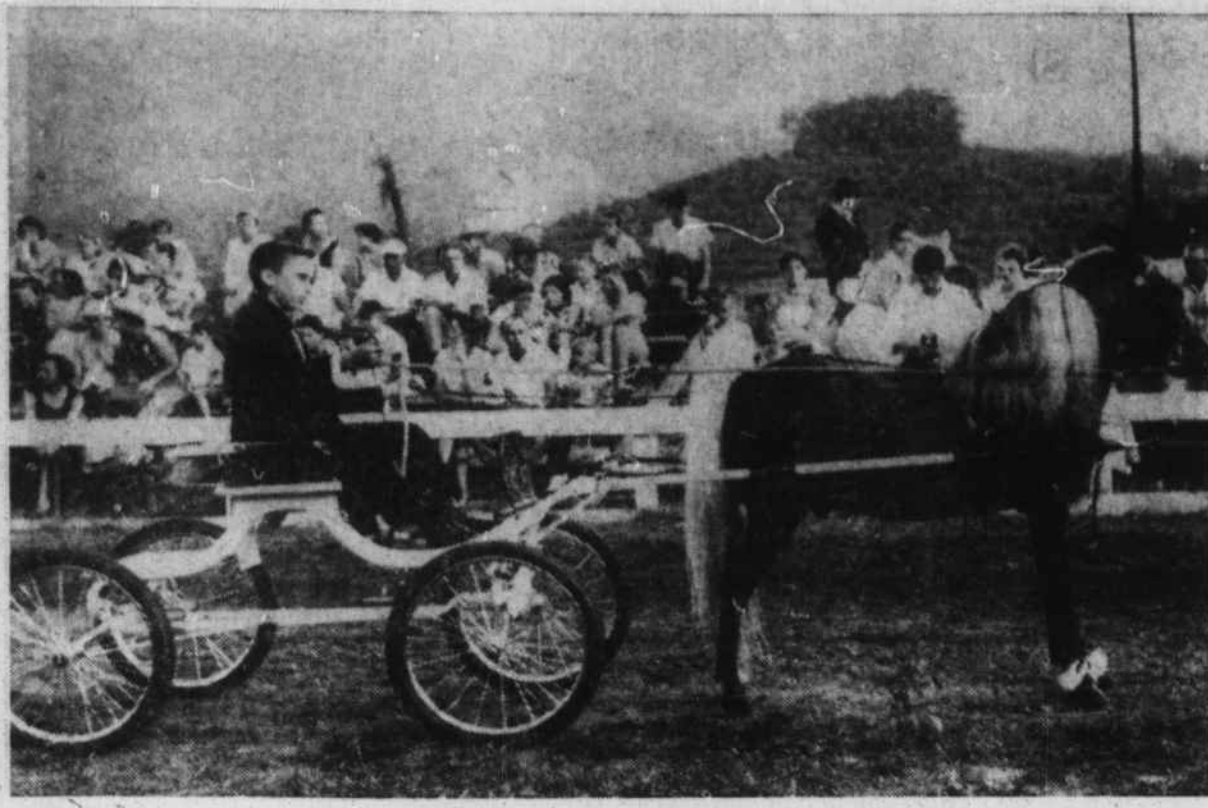
The mother of the bride wore a gray dress with matching accessories and a white carnation corsage. The bridegroom's mother wore a navy and white dress with a corsage of white carnations.

A total of 55 head, both horned and polled, have been entered by 13 Western North Carolina breeders.

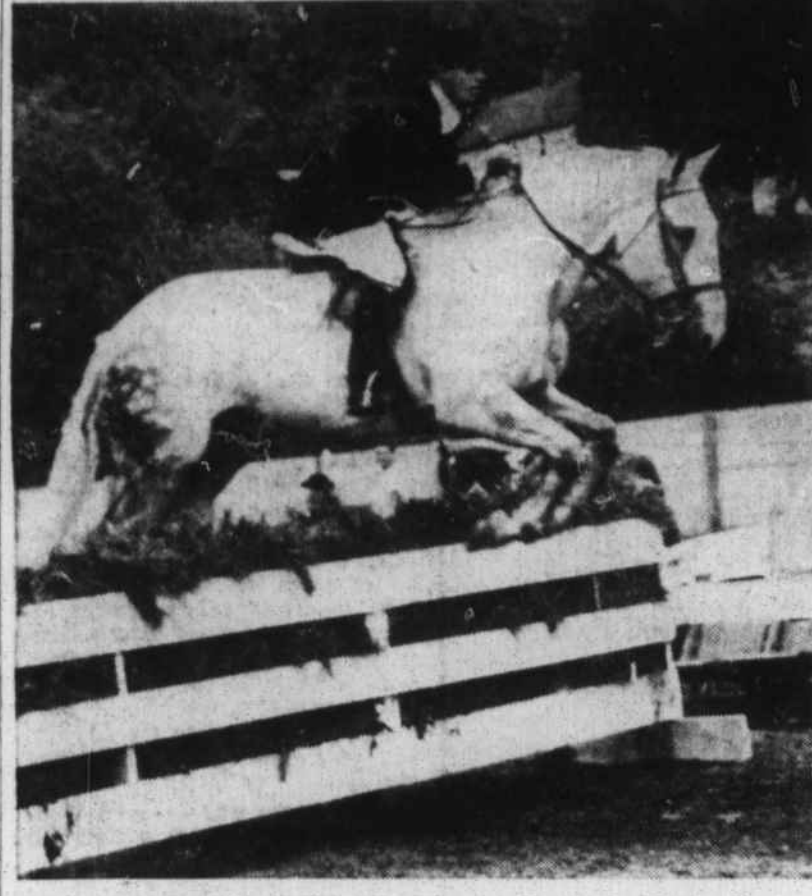
Included in the offering are 10 bulls ready for service and 45 heifers, both open and bred.
