Miss Nancy Bischoff has been awarded a professional nurse traineeship for study in the Duke University School of Nursing. She is one of eight graduate nurses selected to receive traineeships totalling \$25,600. The traineeships were granted as part of a two-million-dollar nationwide program authorized by Congress last July.

Miss Bischoff received a \$2,400 stipend and brightness, others make a bachelor's degree in nursing at Duke. Her traineeship also provides money for tuition and other expenses.

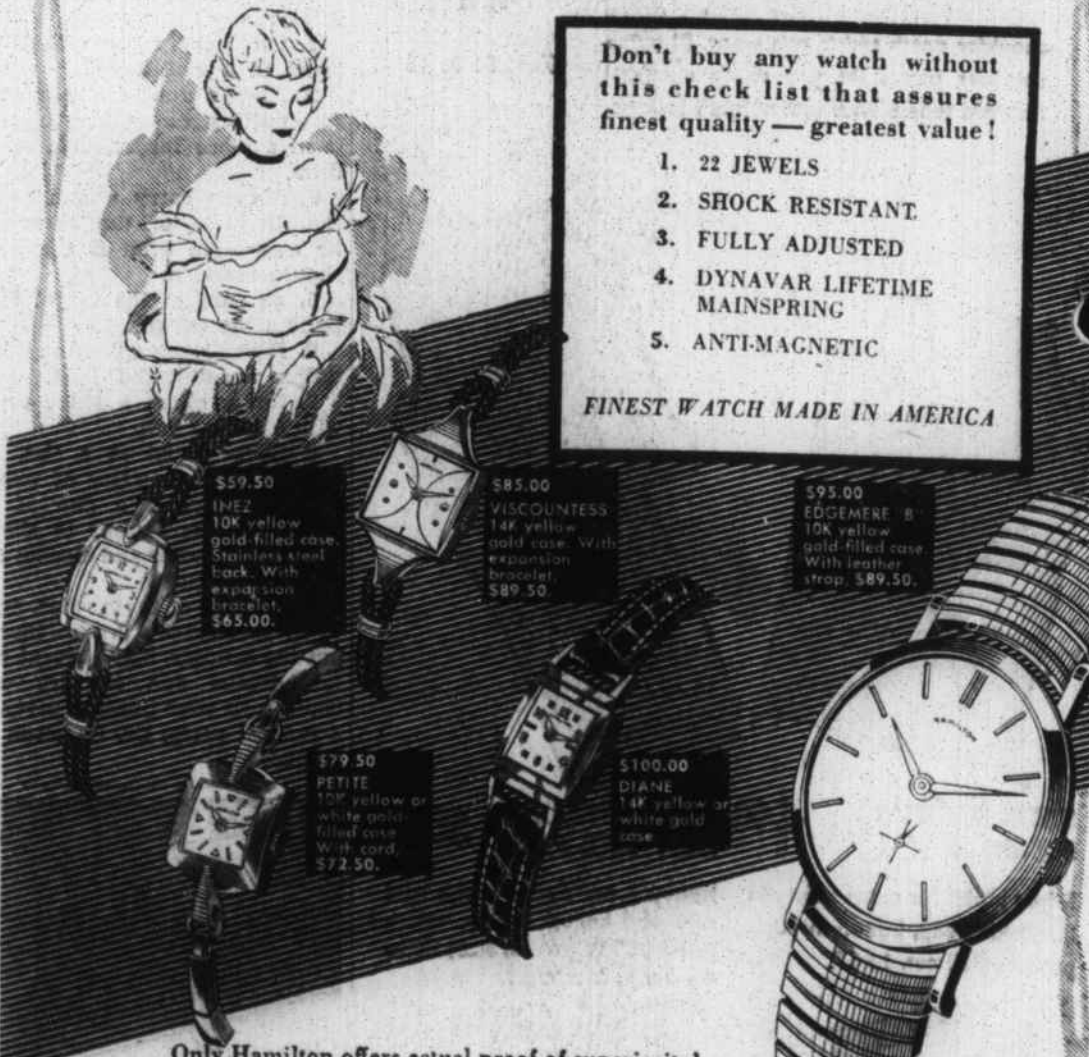
