Chicago Socialite Is Hostess For Democratic 'Volunteers'

By JANE EADS WASHINGTON — Chic, savvy Mrs. Edison Dick, well-to-do Chicago socialite has moved onto the Capital party-front—political, that is. A talented hostess herself, she won't be gracing the local cham-

pagne and caviar circuit. However, if she and her colleagues succeed in their job to help elect Democratic presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson, she'll no doubt be topping many a fancy guest list, including that of the White House. Mrs. Dick, wife of a prominent

industrialist and philanthropist, mother of three grown children and a grandmother, came to Washington after the Chicago convention to serve as co-chairman of the National Volunteers for Stevenson-Kefauver with Barry Bingham of Louisville, Ky., president of the Courier-Journal and Louisville Times. The organization worked to nominate Stevenson at Chicago and now is trying to enlist members of the old Citizens for Kefauver

for President group. Their main job will be in "getting the maximum number of modest contributions" and persuading independent voters to vote for both candidates. At her first press conference, reporters asked why Mrs. Dick and her husband, a manufacturer of mimeograph equipment and both long-time Republicans, had switched to the Democratic front. "My husband and I are longtime personal friends of Mr. Steven-

son's," Mrs. Dick said. "We supported his candidacy for governor of Illinois. We think he made a fine record as governor. And the longer I worked with the Democratic party on Mr. Stevenson's behalf, the more I realized that what the party stood for was nearer my own philosophy of government." She said she had devoted much time to politics over the past 16 years. She hopes to be based here mainly, with occasional weekends at her home in Lake Forest, Ill.
