M. H. Bowles Is Speaker At Woman's Club

Mr. Bowles discussed the organization of the school district with regard to the number of pupils and teachers. He pointed out the importance of regular school attendance on the part of the pupils since the teacher assignment is based on the average attendance for the best six months of the school year.

He mentioned a shift in population from rural districts to towns, which is tending to increase enrollment in the town schools. In this connection he stated that all space is already being used in the new Central Elementary School.

Mr. Bowles explained the new method of registering pupils in the Waynesville High School according to their plan for higher education. College preparatory students are given prerequisite courses with more home work and higher academic standards while students, who do not plan to enter college, are allowed more time for work in the vocational courses including vocational agriculture, business education, industrial arts, and electronics.

He invited the club to an open house which will be held at the high school December 14, preceding the Christmas band concert.

Special music was presented by the boys' quartet from the high school, composed of Jimmy Fowler, Mike Leatherwood, George Wilson and Andy Owen.

Home Agent Gives Hints For Turkey Stuffing

INSIDE SECRETS — TURKEY STUFFING—Stuffing tricks can be the inside secrets to creating your elegant meat and poultry dishes for Thanksgiving occasions: Bread cubes soft or toasted or lightly toasted bread gives a delicious flavor to stuffing, and of course the right herbs, spices and fruits of your choice. Apple, sausage, or oyster stuffing goes well with chicken or turkey, depending on the likes and dislikes of people.

- BREAD STUFFING**
- 1 1/2 quarts soft 1/2-inch bread cubes
 - 1/4 teaspoon sage
 - 1/8 teaspoon pepper
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 cup butter
 - 1/4 c. finely chopped onion
 - 1/4 c. chopped celery
 - 1/2 c. milk
 - 1 egg, slightly beaten.
- Toss bread cubes together with sage, salt and pepper. Melt butter in a skillet. Add onion and celery. Cook over low heat until onion becomes transparent, stirring frequently. Combine beaten egg and milk. Toss lightly with toasted bread cubes. Add celery and onion with butter in which they were cooked. Use to stuff chicken, turkey or meat.
