

COUNTY ADVISES ON CARE OF TOBACCO BEDS; FLEE BUGS & CRICKETS

By L. L. McLENNON Tobacco Bed Flee Bugs It is very important that farmers watch their tobacco beds very closely at this time for flea bugs as these insects can and do destroy small tobacco plants as they deposit their eggs in the soil and the small grubs feed upon the roots of the plants.

Mold Crickets Another insect that does considerable damage to the tobacco beds at this time are mold crickets which plow through the topsoil and destroy the small plants. These insects can be controlled by using a poison bait made of 10 pounds cotton seed meal, 10 pounds rice flour, 1 pound calcium arsenate or arsenate of lead, moistened with 1 part of molasses to 10 parts of water. Moisten this bait so that it will crumble and scatter over the bed.
