

## Barbara Stanwyck, Myrna Loy and Mary Astor Feature Week's Attraction at Duplin

The Duplin opens next Monday with a five picture attraction for the week. Beginning Monday will be "Woman in Red," showing Monday and Tuesday, Wednesday, "Crimson Romance," Thursday, "Wings in the Dark," Friday, "Red Hot Tires" and Saturday "Blue Steele."

Your attention is called to the change in opening hours. During the week the program will open at 7:30 in the evening, instead of the usual hour at 7:15. On Saturday the afternoon show will commence at 1:30, instead of 2:30 and the night show will open at 7:30.

"The Woman in Red," Barbara Stanwyck's latest starring vehicle is scheduled as the feature attraction Monday and Tuesday.

The story deals with the romance of a young aristocratic Kentucky girl, portrayed by Miss Stanwyck, who through family financial reverses, becomes a professional rider at society horse shows. She meets Gene Raymond in the role of a scion of a blue blooded Long Island family, also impoverished. It is love at first sight with both of them. But Miss Stanwyck's employer, a part played by Genevieve Tobin, is herself madly in love with Raymond, and vows to break up the match between Miss Stanwyck and Raymond.

Wednesday's program will feature Ben Lyon and Sari Maritza in "Crimson Romance."

"Wings in the Dark," scheduled for the Thursday only attraction is a love story laid against the timely and topical plot of a pilot

who dares death in the perfection of "blind-flying." It stars beautiful Myrna Loy and Cary Grant as a pair of flying daredevils. And although it is impossible to gain any the excellence of Miss Loy's recent pictures, she seems to excel even in her breezy, down-to-earth and sympathetic role in "Wings in the Dark."

Cary Grant's characterization is equally gratifying. His very difficult role is superbly handled, and he gives a powerful performance which should be remembered for a long time. Deprived of his usual good looking clothes, he is a leather-jacketed pilot almost throughout and proves that he can hold his own admirably as an actor.

The Chinquapin Chapter has started its 1935 year with bright prospects. We are trying to make this the best year since we organized. There is an active enrollment of 28 members, and all state dues have been paid one hundred percent.

Members of the Chapter have spent some time in pruning the shrubbery on the school campus with the aim of beautifying the school grounds. We have cleaned large quantities of tobacco seed for the farmers this spring and culled several flocks of hens in the neighborhood. We have also improved our classroom by classifying the bulletins and removing old paint and varnish from the tables. We are going to revarnish them. In addition to our work, we have framed the Future Farmer Creed and Charter; they are framed under glass, and we have them hanging in the class room.

By pruning and spraying the orchard on the estate of G. B. D. Parker we are receiving three

hundred pounds of apples per acre. Our Chapter has received five hundred (500) pounds of sulfate of soda from the Garrett Company, free; it will be used in growing our corn project. The purpose of this project is to earn money to better equip our class room.

Members of the Chapter are appointed every Monday to take charge of the opening and closing ceremony. This is done for to become familiar with the ritual. We hold two meetings each month, using the F. F. A. Ritual in all meetings. We also have a report of the secretary and treasurer at all meetings. The boys seem to show a fine spirit of cooperation, and we feel that we are going to be successful in all our undertakings.
