gration laws. They were defeated in the last Congress when their major measure came to a vote, which proposed to lodge extraordinary powers with the Secretary of Labor and to confer upon her jurisdiction in handling alien deportation cases, which, under the law, are exercised by courts of justice. This measure must be defeated again, as the Kerr Bill is a substantial reproduction of the obnoxious bill which was decisively defeated at the last session of Congress.

While this measure was voted down, it was favorably reported by the Committee on Immigration of the House of Representatives, which Committee defeated other good bills in the interest of Americans by smothering and pigeon-holing measures designed to correct the weak spots in our immigration laws. The Chairman of this Committee has absolutely refused or grant hearings on Blanton Bill which would stop all foreign immigration for a period of ten years.

It is high time for the American people to call a halt to their Representatives in Congress, to a alien interests. Good Americans labor protective legislation must be supported, such as the bills introduced by Congressmen Dies, Green and Taylor. These will safeguard the best interests of the American people.

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The Immigration Issue

There are two sets of bills which restrictions were lifted. There are thousands of Mexicans and citizens of South American countries, as well as those of Canada, who are ready to enter the United States as soon as conditions improve. There are no quota restrictions on immigrants from countries of the Western Hemisphere.

The American worker has been in competition with alien labor for many years, and is in competition with the seven million unassimilated aliens who are in America at the present time. This competition is serious, and unless Congress acts promptly our American workman will be subjected to a new flood of unneeded and low priced competitors in the near future. The American taxpayer is carrying a heavy burden now by reason of a law which has been introduced in the present Congress. One of these would strengthen the immigration and deportation laws. The other would, in a large degree, nullify them.

It is estimated by the Department of State that more than a million aliens would seek admission to the United States, under present quotas, if present temporary laws which they can't understand the protection afforded the American worker in our restrictive immigration laws, and there is a manifest tendency in the Department of Labor, at Washington, to show leniency and undue consideration to aliens who are liable for deportations. Only nine thousand deportations occurred last year as compared with eighteen thousand the year before. Not such a good record for the Department of Labor.

There are two sets of bills in Congress which have been introduced at the present session, and which are being pushed with vigor. One set of these laws is designed to plug the leaks in our present laws and prevent this country from being loaded with excess labor. Those in this country who are on record as excess workers and their families arrive in the future. It does not seem possible that under these conditions there should be any leniency toward those who

thinning and weakening our immigration laws. The fact remains, however, that opponents of restriction, both in and out of Congress. The Junior Order is pushing this kind of legislation. The other set of laws gives no relief but takes away many of the safeguards of the present immigration and deportation laws. This set of bills is being supported under the guise of relieving the distressed, of the comparatively small number of illegally admitted aliens. It is evident that the supporters of these bills are really using a few exceptional hardship cases as an excuse for a general weakening of our immigration laws.

The bills to strengthen the laws, protect the American worker and provide reasonable relief in exceptional cases of hardship, have been introduced at this session of Congress by both Democrats and Republicans, members of the Junior Order, including Congressman Dies of Texas, Congressman Green of Florida, Blanton of Texas, and Taylor of Tennessee. These good bills are H. R. 5921, 6367, 7079 and 7223. We are giving these our whole-hearted support.

Congressman Kerr of North Carolina has introduced Bill, H. R. 8798, at the request of the immigration authorities in the Department of Labor. On its face it indicates a strengthening of deportation laws, but in its substance it indicates a strengthening of the authority to nullify the immigration laws and to permit persons, who are subject to deportation or violation of our American laws, to remain here in this country.

It is unfortunate that the head of the Department of Labor, and the Chairman of the Immigration Committee of the House of Representatives, appear by their actions to be actively identified with alien interests. Not a single one of these persons or officials has a record of favoring any measure which really safeguards the working people of America by substantially limiting the entry of foreigners. On the other hand, they have done all in their power to promote laws which would weaken the immi-
