Do Not Cut Horns Or Split Tails Of Cows; Only Superstition

An old superstition that cows are sometimes afflicted with disease known as "hollow horn" and "split tail" apparently is not dead in North Carolina.

The animal husbandry and dairy department at State College has received inquiries now and then regarding the symptoms and treatment for these "diseases."

F. M. Haig, associate professor in the department stated there are no such diseases among cows or any of the other animals which have horns.

Some people who think their animals are afflicted with these diseases bore holes in the horns or split the tails and fill the cut with salt.

Such practices are not only useless, but cause the animals considerable pain. Professor Haig commented.

When a cow is sick, hot horns are a sign of fever and cold horns are a sign of inadequate circulation of the blood, he added, and thus manifest some constitutional disorder that needs treatment.

The so-called hollow tail is the result of the animals being in a run-down condition, which causes the tail to be limp and soft. It is evident that the animal's body condition is in need of treatment, he pointed out, and not the tail.
