### COMPARATIVE FIGURES

It is generally understood that we have the largest stock of money that we have ever had. According to the 1935 World Almanac the total stock of money in the United States in 1935 was \$13,634,380,567.00. Of this amount there was gold coins and bullion amounting to \$7,856,180,556.00. Subtracting this amount from the total stock there is left in other money 5,778,200,011.00. Governor E. R. Black of the Federal Reserve Bank in a statement made to the Senate Committee on Banking and Currency January 18, 1934 said that there was held by the Federal Reserve Bank in gold certificates \$942,796.00. Subtracting this amount from the amount of other money given above there is left \$4,725,404.011. Now this amount is supposed to represent the money in actual circulation, but it is too big by whatever amount of gold certificates not accounted for above and also the amount of silver bullion in existence; therefore our total stock of money in actual use is less than five million dollars. Is it any wonder that business is stagnant with so small a stock of money that can be used? It is unlawful for gold or gold certificates to circulate. Silver bullion does not circulate either. As this small stock of money does not do the business it has to be supplemented by bank credit which enriches the money lender and enslaves the borrowers.

This juggling with money is the cause of our economic system and is the chief cause of poverty and crime.—R. G. MAXWELL.
