We trust we may emulate the Spirit of the Sainted lives of those gone before, many of whom lie in the cemetery around the church and have woven in to the new building their influence. They are gone but still live and whisper to us "Love one another, my children, be true to the trust, carry on our work for the Master."

The E. R. A. just as other agencies, is working under the difficulty of changing policies. The E. R. A. is dynamic rather than static. Every dynamic set up has to keep pace with the changing economic and social forces which bring about situations that effect different individuals in different ways. It is difficult to state exactly under what conditions a family is eligible for relief, for each case must be judged on its own merits. No two cases are ever exactly alike. However, individuals who have money crops are rarely eligible for relief. Further, a client whose contract with the Rural Re-Settlement Corporation has not expired is not eligible for relief from the E. R. A. A client must either be with one organization or the other; he can not be connected with both. The E. R. A. is urging all clients to register with the U. S. E. S. It is wise for others seeking jobs to register too. Registration, however, does not assure one a job, but those registered are considered for placement whenever inquiry for workers is made.
