STEEL TRAP STARVE COON

Last week some Duplin hunters went to a nearby swamp to hunt for coons. They turned the dogs loose some distance from any homes or cleared land and waited. Soon the dogs treed but with a unfamiliar bark. They went to the dogs and found that they had treed a coon which was caught in a steel trap. The coon was backed against a tree trying to put up a last fight. On examination the coon was found to be nothing but skin and bones, having been caught in the trap perhaps for weeks and was gradually starving to death. Cypress knees and nearby bark had been eaten to ward off the com-ing hunger. Some hunter had set the traps and had failed to return to them and had caused all this suffering and agony for the animal. Any person setting traps should be required to visit the traps each morning and each night and any failure to so do should be punished for cruelty to animals. We hope that all trappers will ei-ther visit their traps at regular times or see that all traps are thrown so as to protect the ani-mals. A little further on one of the dogs was caught in another trap, so the boys called in the dogs and came home.

how so as to aid greatly in getting water and tools to the scene of the fire. There is attached to the en-gine of the truck a small power pump which will draw water from a stream or well and throw it for some thirty or forty feet in the air. There is about 100 feet of hose which can be affectively used in stopping fires at road crossings, and the like.

Mr. Miller says that he is will-ing to help any person in trouble by a forest fire, but that neither he nor the deputies are available for private burning. Therefore if

you want to burn off a field be sure that you have the fire secured before setting it, and then if the fire should get beyond your con-trol, your forestry service is ready to aid, but always remember that you are responsible for all damage and expense.

Mr. Miller recommends that in case of property damage by fire, the parties interested try to get together and settle it out of court, but in case this cannot be done, the department is ready to use the courts to bring about a settle-ment.
