Wary WPA Builds Four Gyms Spends Over \$50,000 in County

> Work will be commenced tom pin gymaasium, according to announcement made here today. The Chinquapin gym will be the fourth built in Duplin County this year with the aid of WPA. Wallace and Warsaw gyms have been completed and the Kenansville gym is now under constduction.

WPA ahs spent approximately \$3500 on each gym in Duplin County, a total of \$15,000.

This year North Carolina has built 19 gyms with the aid of WPA and our county has recieved four of them.

In addition to aiding in building gyms in our county it has used about \$14,000 in Federal money on school building repairs. Superintendent Johnson stated that it would have been absolutely impos posible to put our school building in the shape they are today without the aid of WPA.

Also WPA has spent considerable money in Duplin this year on roads and sewing rooms. It is safely estimated that by the end of 1937 Duplin will have hecieved more than \$50,000 through the
