Mr. Beasley had returned to Warsaw from a trip to Tuscarora, and was headed out on the Warsaw-Wallace highway toward the old Beasley mill pond, when his car stuck in a mud-hole just outside of Warsaw. In stepping from the car to the ground Mr. Beasley's foot slipped on the mud and he was thrown to the ground, the force of the fall, and the probable striking of some object dislocated the shoulder. He was taken to the office of Dr. Straughan, where the shoulder was secured and strapped, and was brought to his home in Kenansville. Mr. Beasley says that he is feeling fine, and that he has slept well every night and expects to be back in his office by the end of the week.

CO. SCHOOLS WILL OPEN IN LATE AUGUST

With the County Board of Education recommending August 26, and August 30 as opening dates for the 1937-38 school term, the board of the school board will soon be heard in Duplin County, and summer vacations will come to an end for teachers and pupils. Two schools, Calypso and Kenansville, have definitely decided upon their opening dates, Calypso opening on August 26th, and Kenansville on August 31. D. P. Johnston, superintendent of county schools, said this week that opening on August 26th, and taking two days for the Thanksgiving holiday, schools would have four months, and three days of their term completed by the Christmas holidays. This will enable these schools to close on April 19, which is considered early enough for the truck growing sections of the county. Opening on August 30, schools will close on April 23.

WHITEVILLE TOBACCO MARKET BOOSTERS ON TOUR JULY 28TH

TO VISIT DUPLIN WITH 25-CAR MOTORCADE AND SOUND SEDAN, "VOICE OF WHITEVILLE"

Whiteville, N. C., July 22.—The boosters of the Whiteville Tobacco Market will tour through Cumberland, Harnett, Sampson, Duplin. About 25 cars with over one hundred representative citizens, headed by a beautiful, sound-equipped sedan, "The Voice of Whiteville" will leave Whiteville at 8:30 Wednesday morning headed for Evergreen, Proctorville, St. Paul's, Hope Mills, Fayetteville, Wade, Godwin, Lillington, Erwin, Coats, Dunn, Benson, Four Oaks, Bentonville, Shady Grove, Keener, Clinton, Ingold, Garland and Elizabethtown. Short stops will be made at all of these places and intervening communities. This is a more of a get-acquainted motorcade to let farmers know that the entire citizenship of Whiteville is vitally interested in the development of their town, and the great activity about the warehouses as they are preparing for the great season in the history of the Whiteville Tobacco Market. Whiteville has Six Big Warehouses and three sets of buyers and there is a likelihood of a fourth set being here, due to the enormous crop of tobacco in this section.

The first seven grades will secure all of their basic books free of any cost. The supplementary reader rental fee will be for the first two grades, 50 cents; for the next two grades, 60 cents; for the next three, 70 cents.

1000's To Attend Farm - Home Week

Farm and Home Week at State College, August 2-6, will be an educational vacation for thousands of North Carolina farmers and farm women. Along with the lectures and demonstrations will be plenty of entertainment to provide good time for all, said John W. Goodman, assistant director of the State College extension service. On the more serious side of the program, special attention will be given the soil conservation program dairying and livestock, farm forestry problems, farm tenancy, farm organizations and cooperatives, farm finance, poultry production, and other timely subjects.

The short course for women will cover numerous phases of home-making on the farm, and certificates will be awarded to those who will have completed their fourth consecutive short course. Rural ministers of the State have been invited to meet at the college during the week. Special programs have been arranged for them, and they will also be invited to attend general meetings for the farm men and women.

Among the speakers for Farm and Home Week are: Harry L. Brown, assistant secretary of Agriculture; Congressman Harold D. Cooley; Gov. Clyde R. Hoey; J. B. Hutson, assistant director of the soil conservation program; Perkins Coville, U. S. Forest Service. Dr. C. W. Warburton, director of the national agricultural extension service; Miss Grace Frysinger, senior home economist, U. S. Department of Agriculture; W. Kerr Scott, State Commissioner of Agriculture; Louis H. Bean, economic advisor, Agricultural Administration; and the Rev. L. P. Burney, rural minister near Charlotte. Games, contests, tours, dramatic plays, group singing, and a spirit of fellowship will help make the week entertaining as well as instructive, Goodman stated.

DUPLIN COUNTY TO JOIN FAISON AND CLINTON IN CELEBRATION OPENING ONLY COTTON ROAD IN U. S.

Duplin County will join with Faison and Clinton on Tuesday, August 3, in a sectionwide celebration of the opening of the Cotton Link road from Faison to Clinton. This road 14 miles long, with a cotton base, is the only road of its kind of this length in the United States. Its opening is an event of not only local, but nationwide importance. Cotton, used as a base for this road will find a new use, if it should become generally used in road building. Heralding a new era for this section, the towns of Faison and Clinton, linked by the Cotton road are planning a joint celebration, which will be held in the two towns. In addition to its type of structure the new cotton road shortens the route from Washington, D. C. to Jacksonville, Fla., by nine miles.

H. R. Cates, of Faison, member of the celebration steering committee, and chairman of the finance committee this week announced the program for the celebration in Clinton. A motorcade will leave Goldsboro at 9:30 and proceed to Faison where they will be greeted by Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Williams, at their home. Mr. and Mrs. Williams are official host and hostess for the celebration at Faison. Henry L. Stevens, of Warsaw, former national commander of the American Legion will be the principal speaker. Rivers D. Johnson, former State Senator, of Warsaw, will be master of ceremonies. Mayor E. S. Owens, of Faison, will greet the assembled public, and offer the keys to the city to the visitors. The address of welcome will be made by Mrs. Marshall Williams. The events will be broadcast over the farm home hour from Faison from 11 to 11:30. The broadcast from Clinton will be from 12:30 to 1:00.

Among notables, who are expected to attend are: Governor Clyde R. Hoey, General McCloskey, W. Kerr Scott, commissioner of agriculture, Thad Eure, Col. J. W. Harrison, Congressman Graham Barden, Senator R. B. Reynolds, Congressman J. Bayard Clark and others. After the speaking at Faison watermelon and lemonade will be served under the oaks on the spacious grounds at the Marshall Williams home. From Faison the motorcade will proceed to Clinton where the remainder of the celebration is to take place. The army band from Fort Bragg and the Goldsboro municipal band will provide the music for the celebration.

Measurement Farms Begins This Week
