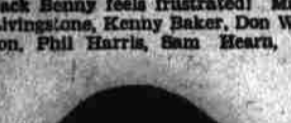
missioners of the County of Duplin, North Carolina, as follows: Section 1. Pursuant to The County Finance Act of North Carolina, as amended, bonds of the County of Duplin, North Carolina, are hereby authorized to be issued in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$56,000, for the purposes hereinafter described. Section 2. The proceeds of said bonds shall be applied solely to the payment of the cost of construction of school buildings and additions and improvements to existing school buildings, including necessary equipment therefor. Section 3. A tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds when due shall be annually levied and collected. Section 4. A statement of the County debt of Duplin County has been filed with the Clerk of the Board of Commissioners of said

County and is open to public inspection. The foregoing Order has been introduced and a sworn statement has been filed under the County Finance Act showing the assessed valuation of the County to be \$18,614,874, and the net debt for school purposes including the proposed bonds, to be \$343,000. A tax will be levied for the payment of the proposed bonds and interest if the same shall be issued. Any citizen or taxpayer may protest against the issuance of such bonds at a meeting of the Board of County Commissioners to be held at ten o'clock, A. M., November 1, 1937, or an adjournment thereof. 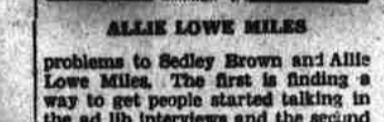
RIGHT OUT OF THE AIR

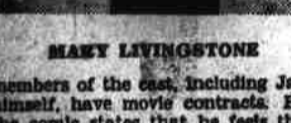

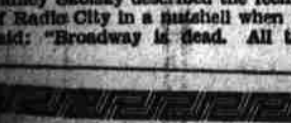
