

## WILMINGTON PRESBYTERY MEETS, CLINTON TUESDAY

Wilmington Presbytery met in regular fall session in the Graves Memorial Presbyterian Church in Clinton, Tuesday morning at 11. The retiring moderator, J. H. Clark requested Rev. H. H. Poole of Elizabeth City to preach the opening sermon. Mr. Poole preached on the "New Birth." He stated

that there was a universal need for the New Birth because of the universality of sin, and that the New Birth was the only way to conquer sin. We don't need a new message, but the same old message that Jesus preached "Ye must be born again." It is our duty as a church to hold before the world, Jesus as the only way.

Rev. H. H. Poole was then elected moderator for the session. There was a full enrollment of members for the meeting. Rev. A. D. P. Gilmore, D. D., presented the progress of the Annuity campaign which was encouraging. The report on religious education revealed that there was marked progress made

during the year in the Vacation Church Schools, the Young People's work, and the Leadership Training Department.

Rev. J. W. Miller spoke during the afternoon session on the "Will of God." We need to recognize that God has a plan and that He will carry out that plan. We should then be willing to find His will and strive to make it ours. When we do that, it brings satisfaction to our lives and inspires us to service. The angels do His will gladly, quickly and submissively, and we should do the same. If we will see His will, it will bring happiness, success, courage, and approval of God.

The evening service of Tuesday was given over to the Foreign Mission meeting at which Rev. Lucy Moffett of China spoke on the conditions there. Mr. Moffett

has just returned from China and gave first hand information on the situation. You will find extracts from his address in a special article in this issue of the Times.

### SECOND DAY

Rev. W. H. Babcock of Pink Hill spoke at the devotional period Wednesday morning on Evangelism. He warned of the danger of putting emphasis elsewhere in our ministry. Jesus' command was to preach, and by the foolishness of preaching, men are saved.

The Home Mission report was encouraging with all fields filled except one, and the work better than ever before. Dr. Wilson spoke in the interest of the work.

All colleges had glowing reports of record attendance. Flora MacDonald College will launch a campaign to secure \$250,000 endowment during the coming year.

Presbytery voted in favor of the Federal Council, but left the question of changes in the Constitution and catechism and the Commission on Minister's Work to a later meeting. The question of the number of stated meetings a year will be discussed at the regular states meeting next spring.

Rev. C. H. Storey, D. D., preached a powerful sermon on the "Righteousness of God," the doctrinal sermon for the session. Rev. Frank Hall, was appointed to preach the sermon at the next meeting of presbytery.

Presbytery accepted the invitation of Flora MacDonald College to meet there in joint session with Fayetteville and Orange Presbyteries next spring. The adjourned meeting will be held in Wallace on Nov. 30 at 11:00.
