Welfare Workers Up to Necks Now

According to Mrs. Harvey Seney, the Duplin County Welfare Office has received more applications for help during the current month than at any time since 1935. The County Home now is taking care of more people than in several years, she said, and as many as 40 has ever had at one time. Applications for food, enlistment in OOO camps, juvenile reports, etc., last Monday amounted to 371. So far this month there have been reported to the Department 14 juvenile cases to receive attention, 9 of them being reported during the week of Nov. 30th.

county. The purpose of this program is both educational and recreational. It is essential that all children regardless of financial status are taught the value of good character and the advantages of a clean healthy mouth and serviceable teeth. They also receive instruction in the great dangers to the system in general which lie hidden in decayed and loosened teeth and infected gums. It is corrective in that those children who can not afford the services of a private dentist are given an examination and if they are found to need dental attention their parents are notified through the mails. Dr. Keonoe urges that any parent receiving a notice of this kind to consult their regular dentist immediately.

This work is sponsored by the State Board of Health cooperating with the County Board of Health, the County School Officials and the County Commissioners.

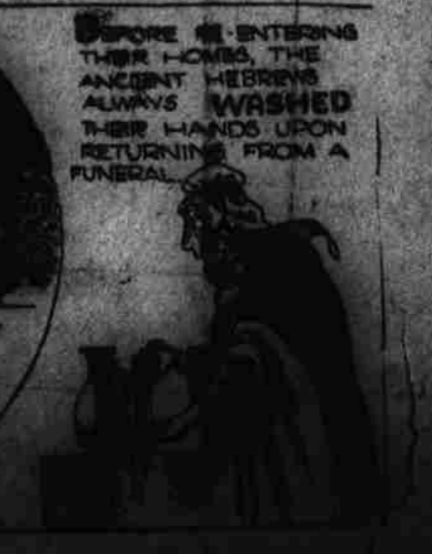
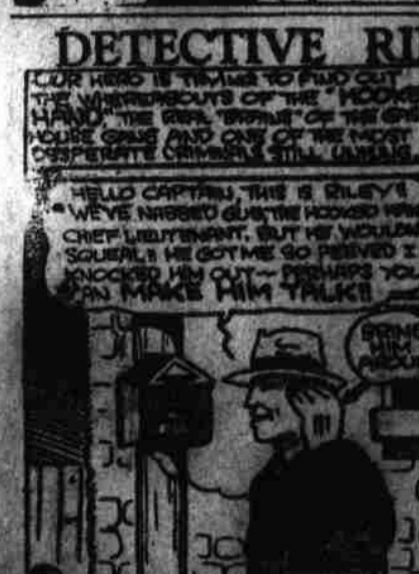

It has been said that the child with a clean mouth is rarely ever sick and the child with an unclean, unhealthy mouth is rarely ever well. This being true, then we can not expect the child with a mouthful of decayed and loosened teeth to compete with the child who has a healthy mouth. Children in this condition soon become discouraged in their school work because they can not make their grade and want to stop school.

Dr. Keonoe is doing excellent work and says that he is receiving splendid cooperation in this work from the county health department, the county superintendent of schools, the school principals and teachers, and the parents.
