Life is Full of Fun for Aunt Sarah

Rosehill, Jan. 29.—Friends hope that the great will not be repeated, but they have been smiling since Christmas with "Aunt Sarah," because she was not hurt in a fall all the way down a 16-foot chimney in the century-old Williams home near here.

"Aunt Sarah" is Mrs. Sarah Wells, 67 years old, and she lives in the home of a nephew, Daniel Williams, the accident occurred when Mrs. Wells slipped at the top chimney. She did not recover consciousness until reaching the first floor, where she promptly resumed her usual life.

Another nephew, Dr. Graham Williams, made an examination, and apparently there were only minor scratches and bruises. Three days later, declaring she would not break up a family party, Mrs. Wells took an automobile ride of ten miles to Teachey to attend a New Year's dinner in the home of her niece, Mrs. John Wells.

Small and spry, quick-witted, laughing and sweet, Mrs. Wells takes life in a great adventure. Her smiles and happy talk are revealing.

Mrs. Wells says that her husband, the late Daniel Wells, who was also from Duplin County, served through the entire Civil War. She recalls attending a ball at the old Adams School for Boys in Magnolia when her future husband was a member of the regiment stationed there.

Mrs. Wells' closest living relatives are a granddaughter and great granddaughter in Indianapolis.

Virginia Dare's Birth Certificate in London Raleigh.—An official copy of Virginia Dare's birth certificate, signed by President Roosevelt and Governor Hoge, now resides in the archives of "His Majesty's Government," in London. The presentation was made by Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, State Health Officer, through the Department of State, in Washington, which forwarded the framed document through the United States Embassy. "His Majesty's Government" deeply appreciates the gift," Dr. Reynolds was informed, on behalf of Neville Chamberlain. Dr. Reynolds also presented a copy to President Roosevelt, who signed the certificate on the occasion of his visit to Roanoke Island, August 18, last year, when the 350 birthday of Virginia Dare who was the first child of English parents born in the western hemisphere, was celebrated at Fort Raleigh, during the pagant season, which drew thousands of visitors from all parts of the world. Advance Shad Season 30 Days Raleigh.—The Board of Conservation and Development recently voted to forbid shad fishing, advanced the shad season, allowed fishing rules to meet the demands of coastal fishermen. Shad season generally was advanced 30 days and closing date was advanced 10 days. The new date is: Northern Zone—Shad fishing January 23 to April 15, and permit fishing February 1 to April 15. Southern Zone—Shad fishing January 23 to April 15, and permit fishing February 1 to April 15.
