Kinston, April 13—The junior competitive festival of the North Carolina Federation of Music clubs was held Saturday in the high school auditorium at Kinston, under the auspices of the National Federation of Music Clubs.

Mrs. Charles L. Abernethy, Jr., junior counselor for the southeastern district of North Carolina, had charge of the festival, with Dorothy Phelps, of the Meredith College piano department as judge.

Junior clubs represented in the contest were the Major and Minor Club of Fremont, Warsaw Junior Music Club, Richlands Junior Music Club, Kenansville Music Study Club, and 50th of the Young Musicians' Club and the New Bern Junior Music Club of New Bern.

Two grades of superior were made. One went to Alice Sylvester of Richlands of the medium piano solo group; and the other to Margaret Dunn and Frank Moore of New Bern in the moderately elementary piano duo group.

Grades of excellent were awarded to Ray Brewer, New Bern, and Joan Lawrence, New Bern, vocal solos; Edwin Steed, III, Richlands, and Joseph E. Rev. M. J. Murray of Wallace Heads Presbytery

Wilmington, April 13—The Rev. M. J. Murray, of Wallace was elected moderator of the Wilmington Presbytery at the opening session of its 147th meeting at the Winter Park Church here this morning.

He succeeds the Rev. G. A. Wilson, D.D.

The session was opened with a sermon by the Rev. Mr. Wilson and included a special memorial service for the late Rev. William Monroe Wiener, of Kenansville, who was killed in action while serving with the Army in North Africa last November. A sketch of his life as given by the Rev. Mr. Murray.

The afternoon session was devoted to announcement of standing committee presentation of the treasurer's report and other business. The Rev. William Crowe, Jr., of Wilmington, also spoke on "The Purpose & Call of the Westminister Assembly."

The meeting will continue through tomorrow. Sixty-eight churches in Southeastern North Carolina, represented by 38 ministers, comprise the presbytery.
