Points Validated For Slaughtered Pork

Twelve red stamps in War Ration Book Four, with a total value of 120 points, have been validated by the Raleigh District Office of OPA for buying of pork and other rationed meats from farmers.

This will give consumers ample ration points for buying meat from rs who want to slaughter heir hogs on the farm and mar-et them in the form of fresh

The advance use of stamps, it vas explained, does not give the individual who buys from a farm slaughterer a larger meat ration than anyone else. It merely allows the individual buying from a farmer to follow the normal practice of conflicting and complex social and economic theories and tice of buying fairly large amounts national and personal ambitions.

The red stamps in Book 4 which may now be used for buying meat from farmers are those numbered "8" and lettered from "A" through "M". These stamps are worth 10 points each, making a total of 120 points.


