

Air Cadets Help Parents Of Service Sons Pick Cotton For War Bond Dollars

HICKORY, N. C.—The cotton raising Hiltons of Hickory, N. C., have given seven sons to the services. One gave his life at Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7th, 1941. The other six lads are fighting on various fronts. This leaves Mr. and Mrs. Hilton, the parents, to back the attack at home, by getting in the cotton crop on their six-acre farm.

The two remaining Hiltons, though, can't pick cotton as fast as their stalwart sons.

To the rescue came Lt. Joe Golden and seventy Navy Air Cadets from nearby Lenoir Rhyne College, on a surprise visit one Sunday afternoon to pay tribute in labor to the patriotic Hiltons.

Regular cotton picking toe sacks were given out as far as they would go around and the rest of the cadets filled pillow slips to over-flowing with the "fleecey locks." Most of the boys were Northerners and novices, but they picked an estimated 3000 pounds during the afternoon and sang plantation songs while their backs ached from strenuous bending. One New England volunteer commented after awhile, "Yes its true what they say about Dixie."

As a sample of all-out cooper-



ation this joining hands of the armed forces and the home front is unsurpassed. The Hiltons got their cotton in and the Lenoir Rhyne cadets had not only helped with the harvest but had made it possible for the growers to raise not only cotton but also money for War Bonds to "Back the attack" still further.

Spurred by the example, Mrs.

Goldsboro Doctor To Head Tuscorora Council Boy Scouts

Annual Dinner Held Last Friday Night

Goldsboro, Jan. 30.—Dr. D. J. Rose of Goldsboro was elected president of the Tuscorora Council, Boy Scouts, for the coming year at the annual dinner meeting of Scouts and Scouters and interested friends at the Hotel Goldsboro Friday night. Around 200 people from Wayne, Johnston, Duplin and Sampson counties attended. Col. John S. Wise, command-

ing officer of the Pre-Tech Aviation Cadet School at Seymour Johnson Field, delivered the address of the evening.

Officers elected besides Dr. Rose were C. D. Burnette, Charlie Baddour, Charlie Fitzgerald and Roy Cates, vice-presidents; Herman Weil, treasurer; Roy M. Purser, commissioner; and members at large, Emil Rosenthal, W. A. Dees, Abel Warren, Paul Cashwell, Earl Farris, Dr. W. G. Wilson, Glenn W. Grier and Paul L. Borden.

Emil Rosenthal, council president, presided and gave the president's report for 1943. Principal accomplishments were the best camp in the history of the council, growth of the council in the number of Scouts and troops, and the expansion of Negro scouting.

He reported that Mr. and Mrs. N. A. Edwards had given a health lodge to Tuscorora Camp in honor of their son, the late Nelson Arthur Edwards and that Dr. Rose and W. P. Kemp had underwritten a new mess hall to be built before the 1944 camping season. He introduced B. Y. Wolfe, new Scout executive.

E. L. Woodall of Smithfield recognized the following 12 boys, one of whom is now overseas, who have become Eagle Scouts in the past year; Roy Vann and Ralph Starling, Pine Level; Sidney Gardner and Dick Barden, Goldsboro; Selby Seaman, Dudley; Sam Davis Albert Farah, Mt. Olive; Henry

West, Kenansville; Bill Massey, Clayton, and Steve Stefanou, Lone Scout, Salemburg.

John Herring of Smithfield was presented a certificate of heroism for having saved the life of Bobby Farmer, 11, last August when Bobby fell off a log while trying to cross Neuse River. W. A. Dodson of Atlanta, regional director of Boy Scouts of America, made the presentation and made a plea for more Scout leaders.

J. Arthur Best, probation officer for Wayne County for the past 10 years, said that not one Boy Scout has been called into juvenile court here.

Dr. Ros. appointed the following committee: Chairman, E. L. Woodall, advancement committee; C. E. Ives, finance; Dr. A. H. Zealy, health and safety; John Henderson, organization and extension; Moseley Davis of Mt. Olive, camping and activities.
