# Wallace Only Strawberry Market In County

## Berries Sell Up To \$14.00 400 Crates A Day; 1st Week

Opened Last Friday; All Buyers Be On Market Monday.

The Wallace Strawberry Market opened last Friday and through this week has sold better than 400 24 quart crates daily. Prices yesterday ranged from \$10 to \$14 per crate. Offerings are light and quality not so good as first berries are picked. Buyers from all Northern points will be on the market Monday and competition is expected to be much keener next week.

Wallace is the only strawberry market operating in the county this year.

The crop is estimated to be 25 to 50 per cent short this year due to shortage of labor and recent rains and cold weather. Season's peak is expected to be reached around May 5th.

WASHINGTON, April 19. — A new policy of government food management involving fewer controls, less stockpiling for emergency war reserves and for post-war foreign relief uses, and more liberal allowances for civilians is gradually being unfolded by operations of war food agencies.

## 5 Pounds Maximum Extra Sugar Issue

The amount of sugar to be issued on the first application is to be no more than five pounds per person shown on the application. This in addition to the five pounds that was valid on stamp No. 40, will give each person ten pounds of sugar and in many cases will be ample for the entire season.

## Present Book 3 For Shoe Purchase

Persons having received a special shoe stamp will have to present their Ration Book 3 when purchasing shoes. The shoe dealers have been notified that the serial number on the stamp will correspond with the number on the Ration Book of the consumer.
