### HOT WEATHER HINTS FOR SWINE GROWERS

Provide plenty of clean drinking water and ample shade. Drive or load hogs carefully, preferably in the cool part of the day. Do not pour water on hot hogs as this often proves fatal. Oil hogs often to prevent lice and mange. If mange occurs, spray with good stock dip and keep hogs from dusty houses. Feed enough grain to breeding animals to keep in reasonable breeding flesh, but not too fat. Bed the farrowing house with damp sand, if early fall pigs are expected. Give growing pigs ample grain and protein supplement to keep in thrifty condition. If early corn, soybeans, etc. are to be hogged down, don't forget water, shade and minerals.

### COUNTY'S FARMERS CAN REDUCE COSTS WITH 4-WAY JEEPS

Farmers of Duplin, many of whom have indicated through a national survey their desire to own a "Jeep" after the war, can save about \$2,347,884 for post-war rehabilitation if they take advantage of the Jeeps 4-sided personality, a recent study reveals. This figure is based on the difference between the estimated price of a post-war Jeep and the total cost of four farm units that the Jeep may replace. It is said that the Jeep can be used as an effective four-purpose substitute for the horse, the tractor, the independent power unit and the light truck. Washington State College and Ohio State University demonstrate that the vehicle, in its present military form, serves many all-around purposes effectively, especially for the small farm.

## RATION DEADLINE

(NOTE: The Raleigh District Office of Price Administration compiles this thumbnail ration guide from official sources each week for the Duplin Times as a public service feature.) RATION CALENDAR JULY 2 TO JULY 8 PROCESSED FOODS: Blue A-8 through V-8 now valid at 10 points each, for use with tokens. Good indefinitely. W-8 thru Z-8, and A-5 good July 1. MEATS AND FATS: Red A-8 through W-8 (Book 4) now valid at 10 points each, for use with tokens. Good indefinitely. X-8, Y-8, Z-8 good July 2. CANNING SUGAR: Sugar stamp No. 40 good for 5 pounds of canning sugar until February 28, 1945. Apply to local boards for supplemental rations. SUGAR: Stamp No. 32 becomes valid for five pounds on June 16. SHOES: Airplane Stamps No. 1 and 2, (Book 3) valid indefinitely. FUEL OIL: Period, 4 and 5 coupons (10 gals) expire Sept. 30. GASOLINE: A-10 coupons now valid and will expire August 8. NOTE: Rationing rules require that every car owner immediately write his license number and state on all gasoline coupons in his or her position. RENT CONTROL: All persons renting, or offering for rent, any living quarters whatsoever: must register each dwelling unit with rent control office in their rent area. In counties not under rent control, persons who feel that they are being overcharged for rents may submit complaints to OPA on complaint forms which are available at the local War Price and Rationing Board.

## Some Householders Get Oil Increase

RALEIGH, June 28 - Householders who heat their homes only with oil heating stoves will be given extra fuel oil allowances equal to 10 percent of their renewed fuel ration for heat when children under 6 years of age live in the household. OPA said today. This allowance may not exceed the amount that is allowed for the same purpose in homes heated by central heating plants. This is 50

gallons in North Carolina. Children's allowance this year is about the same as last year.

## Southern Farm Summary

Cotton prices closed the 4th week of June in a new high despite a down-turn at the end. Trade interest centered on the amendments to the emergency price control act. Weather continued favorable for the progress of the new crop. Most fruits and vegetables continued moderate with peak movement of several items past. Due to dry weather, potatoes from some areas are small and yields light. Prices unchanged from last week.

Hog prices within the supported weights and grades were fully steady, but medium and cull hogs encountered some price discounts. Hogs outside support groups were strong to as much as 25 cents higher in spots. Cattle markets were active all over the country. Grassy slaughter offerings were off some, while fed cattle held steady in the south but lost about 25 in the midwest. Spring lambs were barely steady to weak. Tops at Nashville to \$14.50, and Louisville \$15.00. Eggs were steady on moderate receipts. Large white grade A in Atlanta, 35, Raleigh 32 and Richmond, 34. Live poultry remained liberal. Only fancy quality held steady to firm.
