He had been ill for several days but his condition became more serious until death took him away.

Funeral services were conducted at the home Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, with Rev. J. R. Edwards in charge, assisted by Rev. J. H. Sutton.

Mr. Kennedy was a member of the Methodist church. He was born in Sampson county in June 1886, living to the age of 58 years.

He was twice married, first to Ophelia Knowles, by whom he was the father of three children, Jimmy, Kennedy of Wilmington, the only one surviving.
