Fight Household Flies, Mosquitoes With Insecticide

KEEPING the home free of flies, mosquitoes and other flying insects in summertime should be a "must" on every homemaker's schedule. Not only are flying bugs an annoyance, but many types of the common household fly are dangerous disease-carriers. They breed in filth and carry harmful bacteria to anything they touch. Secure screening and an active campaign with an effective fly-water are the first steps in ridding the indoors of these pests. Keep your bottle of liquid insecticide and a spray gun handy, for flies somehow manage to get into even the best-screened house.

ANTY-INSECT. When cut flowers are brought in from the garden, spray them lightly with liquid insecticide. This will kill off small insects that hover around bouquets.

WAY down in Georgia, Farmer Brown has his own ideas about what a salad supper should be like. He wants no silly tea party food on a table; it's either substantial and muscle building or he'll have no part of it. Practical man that he is, Farmer Brown has selected his own home-grown products for this salad and wisely because there are plenty of eggs. Although he's fortunate enough to have a great big ham in his smokehouse, you, too, can get it now at your butcher's without ration points. Nancy Holmes of the Best Foods kitchens passes along Mr. Brown's recipe because it's a home food and should appeal to the masculine members of the household in particular. She suggests you begin your meal with a hot soup and finish with a dessert of blueberry or blackberry pie and iced tea. After a meal like this the menfolk will certainly want to shake Farmer Brown.

Farmer Brown's Salad
1/2 lb. ground beef, 1/2 cup chopped onion, 1/2 cup celery, 1/2 cup tomato, 1/2 cup salt, 1 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon mustard with horseradish, 1 large cantaloupe, 1 hard-cooked egg, chopped greens.
Mix ham and mustard with horseradish. Shape into 4 balls. Fry in 1 tablespoon real mayonnaise, until brown. Mix eggs, celery, seasonings and 1/2 cup real mayonnaise thoroughly. Place a ham ball in bottom of a custard cup. Place egg mixture firmly on top of ham ball. Unmold on chop plate. Repeat to make 6 molds. Arrange cantaloupe sections between ham and egg molds. Place lettuce or salad greens in center of plate. Yield: 6 servings.
