### CRITICAL NURSE SHORTAGE

Major General Norman T. Kirk, Surgeon General of the Army, an-nounced today that there is a cri-tical shortage of nurses in the Army and that there has been a disappointing response to the call for 10,000 additional nurses who

for 10,000 additional nurses who must be recruited within the next few months.

He said the Medical Department had expected to recruit at least 4,000 nurses during September, but only 500 had applied for commissions.

There are now 209,000 civilian nurses exclusive of 112,000 student nurses, in the U. S. and Gen. Kirk suggested that to reduce the number by 10,000 would not cripple nursing services for the civilian population. "Surely there are 10,000 graduate, registered nurses who are willing to join the Army to help out in this emergency." he said.
