Warsaw Resident First Marine To Receive Navy Cross War II

Sgt. Willard D. Darling Risked Life to save Officer at Bombing of Pearl Harbor.

Sgt. Willard D. Darling, 35, chief clerk of the 9th Battalion of the Infantry Training Regiment at Fort Camp, Camp Lejeune, is credited with being the first Marine to receive the Navy Cross in World War II.

Then a Marine, Pfc. he was awarded the medal after risking his life to save an officer during the attack on Pearl Harbor. He was serving on board the USS Oklahoma as an orderly to the executive officer when the Nip airships zoomed in overhead for their sneak attack.

Seeing the officer in the water, too weak to swim and apparently drowning Darling dove from the motor launch on which he was being evacuated and swam to his superior, keeping him afloat until he could hail another launch.

Left alone in the launch with the officer in the vicinity of a dredge pipeline in the harbor, after the crew had abandoned the craft during the catastrophe, he decided the best to do was to jump into the water and direct the officer to follow him. This they did. The officer was too exhausted to swim, so Darling brought him safely ashore in the face of severe enemy fire.

After serving on sea duty and at Pearl Harbor, he was with a radar outfit for eight months overseas. He saw action at Guadalcanal. Besides the Navy Cross, he has a letter of commendation from Admiral Nimitz, citation from the commander-in-chief of the U. S. fleet, and a letter of merit from Gen. Thomas Holcomb, former commandant of the Marine Corps. Sgt. Darling lives in the Russ Apartment in Warsaw.

SMITH TOWNSHIP SOLDIER WRITES TO HIS MOTHER

The following letter was received recently by Mrs. Maggie Smith of Rt. 2, Pink Hill from her son, Sgt. Lloyd Smith:

Oct. 27, 1944

My Dearest Mother: Will write another letter tonight I don't know when I will ever get time to write again. I am still in a G. M. town. I have never been as scared as I was this morning. I had just gotten a letter from Pansy and when I opened it the German shells started coming in. I just dropped everything and ran for my cellar. I am staying in the cellar of a house. They are pretty strong all of the time. I have been over seas. Thought it was hell where I was before I came here, but if there ever was a hell this is it. All I am hoping for is to come out on top and get back home. About all you can hear are our guns firing 24 hours a day. I know the next town where we are firing on is blown all to pieces.

This makes the eighth country I have been in and I hope it is my last one until it is over. You can tell all the boys we are giving Germany what they need. Don't worry about me. Mother, for I hope I can come back to you some day. Tell all to pray for me. Tell the kids hello. Answer real soon with a long letter, Mother. From your loving son, S/Sgt.
