POTATO GROWERS GET HIGHER PRICE
Producers of early white potatoes will receive ceiling prices assuring them of the same return as a year ago and about 17 cents a hundred-weight above the legal minimum price. It is announced by the OPA. At the same time, the consumer will find the average cost of this early crop of po-

tatoes will be the same as retail prices of last season.
NEW CEILING PRICE LISTS FOR RETAILERS
Supplemental ceiling price lists that will include a the changes that have been made in the prices of dry groceries since issuance of the current quarterly community ceiling price lists will soon be for-

warded to food retailers OPA announces. Objectives of the additional lists is to make it easier for retailers and consumers to keep track of changes in ceiling prices.

LESS NITROGEN FOR FARMS
Continued high military requirements for nitrogen mean that less will be available during 1945 for use on farms, according to a report of the Chemicals Bureau of the WPB to the Nitrogen Producers Industry Advisory Committee.

LIGHT NAPHTHA UNDER RATIONING
Light naphtha, the petroleum product normally used for cooking and lighting, will be brought under rationing control November 20th, in 15 Midwestern states, the OPA stated. This is being done to prevent illegal use of this product as a motor fuel - a practice that has become prevalent in the area.

ARMY RELEASES PACIFIC AREA MAIL
Families of soldiers engaged in operations in the Philippines will soon be receiving batches of mail that have been delayed for security reasons during the period preceding the invasion of these

islands. Some 400,000 letters and a large number of parcels were impounded. This mail originated with units now engaged in American Army operations in the Philippines. Some of the letters date as far back as last July.

94 COUNTIES IN STATE HAVE STUDENTS AT 'WC'
Greensboro, Nov. 11. - The Woman's College draws its enrollment for the 1944-45 session from 94 of the State's 100 counties, from 19 other states, the District of Columbia and five foreign countries.

Out of State enrollments show New Jersey with 45 students, New York, 44, Virginia 42, and South Carolina, 30. Foreign registration shows one student each from Brazil, Costa Rica, Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Uruguay.

NAVY OFFERING TECHNICIAN COURSE
The Navy's program to select and train men between the ages of 18 and 38 in a \$12,000 course preparing them to become radio technicians has been broadened to

include those who have been found physically qualified for military service. Heretofore, only men who volunteered for the Navy or who was assigned to the Navy were eligible to qualify.

All 17 year olds are urged to see the Recruiter when he is in your territory.

ALLOW PASTURES TO REST DURING WINTER

Pasture grasses need to store up food during the winter months so as to make a quick start next

spring and therefore all livestock should now be removed from permanent pastures.

Cattle cause a large amount of physical damage to pasture during winter months that takes some time in the spring for grasses to recover from this bad treatment and put out new growth.

If livestock are removed the grass can build up a winter reserve of food that will enable it to bring earlier grazing in the spring and also more grazing. The same principle is involved as the removal of cattle from the pasture during long dry periods in summer.

JUNIOR RED CROSS ENROLLMENT HIGH

The American Junior Red Cross reached a record enrollment of 18,466,340 in 1944, representing approximately 70 per cent of the nation's school population. Enrollment in this world's largest organization for 1945 was held during November 1-15 of this year.
