Dear Mamma.

I don't have anything to write but I suppose I had better let you know that I'm well and O. K. I didn't receive any mail from you today, but I suppose I will later on. As yet, I haven t received the packages that you were speaking of having sent me. I suppose the Christmas rush has delayed them. Yesterday was my birth day, and out here is certainly a heck of a place to celebrate a birthday. I suppose we all can't have it nice. This is the tenth month without any liberty, and recreation only flour times. I think they are trying to make an endurance test out of us to see how much we can stand. It will soon be a year since I have seen anything to compare with civilization. Yet, they have the nerve to have a war bond drive on the ship and ask us to buy bonds. We fight the war; we finance it; and we will be paying for it, when it is over. At shore stations they ask us to give blood. What more can they expect out of us? Yes, I buy the war bonds, but I don't think it should be expected of a service man. I often wonder if the strikers back in the States ever think of buying a few bonds. They don't seem to think of the fighting man in other respects.

"Senator Norris has many living monuments to his career," Mr. Outlaw said, "but the one which affects the everyday life of every person in this community, rural and urban, is the REA. Norris urged Government action in rural electrification long before the REA program was started in 1935, when only 10 percent of the farms of this country had central station electric service. He lived to see more than 40 percent of our farms get service, under the program which he sponsored in Congress, Our own cooperative, which has it 1,200 members getting service from 320 miles of lines in Wayne, Duplin, Lenoir, and Johnston Counties, is one of many concrete benefits which America gained from Norris' greatness.

"Allocation of relief funds for rural electrification in 1935 by the President was due in large part to Norris' insistance.
