Surplus Inventories Cut

Another step to put America's food rationing program on a current basis was taken this week by OPA, with the recall of surplus inventories of restaurants, hotels and other institutional users of rationed foods, it has been announced.

The new move seeks to put on the same basis the people who eat at home and those who eat out.

During the past year some institutional users, finding they did not need to spend all their points, accumulated excess reserves, either in actual foods or in points on deposit at their banks.

TEACHER SHORTAGE IN N. C. DESPERATE

Greenville, Mar. 10—"The teacher shortage in North Carolina is desperate," declared Superintendent W. M. Jenkins of Durham, speaking last night before the regular monthly ECTC faculty meeting. "The new level of \$125 a month for teachers may easily be too low to help the situation very much. I believe that only a few who left teaching in the last couple years, will ever come back."

Mr. Jenkins, with Superintendent O. P. Johnson of the Duplin County Schools and Superintendent C. W. Davis of Roanoke Rapids, discussed for the ECTC faculty the improvements they would like to see made in the preparation of teachers.

Mr. Jenkins proposed steps that teachers might take in order to

relieve the educational crisis in the state. He suggested that the teachers colleges actively sell the idea of teaching to high school seniors. He urged that more teachers of the type greatly needed be prepared. To raise the level of instruction, he asked that one faculty member be released each semester to visit and assist beginning teachers.

Superintendent Johnson pointed out that forty-seven per cent of the Duplin County teachers were ECTC graduates. Greater emphasis, he said, must be placed upon high scholarship. He suggested that part of the practice teaching be done under actual rural school conditions.

Concurring with Jenkins, he urged that critic teachers visit graduate during the first year of
