Car Tire Quota For Duplin Cut

Duplin county passenger car drivers will have to guard their tires even more carefully if they continue to drive.

Duplin County will have only 245 passenger car tires for rationing in April as compared to 392 in March. The shortage made it necessary to establish a preferential list of occupations for use in selecting persons to receive passenger car tires. This list will be used in channeling the reduced quota of tires to persons whose needs are regarded as most essential to the war effort.


