Cheap gains can be made with hogs when soybeans are used as a grazing crop. This was proven in 1944 by a large number of demonstrations conducted in the state, according to L. F. Weeks, County Agent. The following plan for providing this type of grazing: 1. Plant soybeans now in 24 to

2. Cultivate twice to keep down grass and weeds.
3. Start grazing when soybeans are 12 to 15 inches high.

4. Full feed a mineral mixture.

5. Hand feed 2 to 4 ears of corn daily per 100 pounds pig.

6. Weigh two or three pigs when they are turned on the soybeans. Weigh the same pigs again when have finished grazing the

crop. Figure their gains.
7. Continuous summer grazing can be provided if successive plantings are made about six
