Garrity, who had been Jap prisoner since the fall of Carrigidor, had been returned to military centrol. The telegram read, "The Secretary of War has asked me to inform you that your son, Pfc Garrity, Thomas E. was returned to military control 8 Sept. '45., and is being returned to the United States within the near future. He will be given an opportunity to communicate with you upon arrival. Report further states condition fair. Signed -Robert H.
