Knight led his men through dense jungle and secured their objective. Reconnoitering the area, he found himself in a horseshoe formation of concealed Jap pillboxes and threw grenades, destroying four. Wounded, he saw that those in his command were protected until he died. A medal of honor was awarded Lt. Knight posthumously.

Drive On To Recruit Men

For Woods And Mills Faced with critical labor shortages in pulpwood areas, the Pulp and Paper industry and the U. S. Employment Service will launch a drive for woods and mill workers in 24 states, beginning Monday October 8, according to information received this week.

The jointly sponsored reemployment program, the first of its kind since the end of the war plans to secure jobs for as many as possible.

Plans have been worked out for all mills, contractors operators, suppliers and shippers in major wood-producing communities to inform local U.S.E.S. offices of job openings in their organizations.

Opportunities include jobs for both skilled and unskilled labor in woods and mill work.
