Self of Mt. Olive. Burial was in Winders cemetery near Mt. Olive.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Canine Grady Southerland; seven children, Carl and Henry, of the home, Robert and Leonard, of Warsaw, Leslie, of Besantanus, and Flora-bell and Ruby, of the home; and 11 grandchildren.

Death Claims

Mr. H. H. Brimley

Raleigh, April 8. — Herbert H. Brimley, 84, former director of the Museum division of the State Department of Agriculture and is believed to have served the State longer than any other employee, died last Thursday night at Rex Hospital. He had been in declining health for some time and serious-

ly ill for several days. Mr. Brimley had been connected with the State for over 60 years, and served with the State Museum and as its director for about half a century. He was one of the most widely known of State officials. His death followed his retirement over a year ago.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Robert and Arthur Brimley; a brother, Clement S. Brimley, and a granddaughter.

Mr. Brimley was credited with enlarging and improving North Carolina's museum until it became known as one of the finest in the South. Before the war, more than 200,000 sightseers visited the museum yearly.

A native of Wilmington, near Bedford, England, Mr. Brimley came to America in 1881 with his brother, Clement. His intentions were to establish himself in farming; and he settled on a farm between Raleigh and Cary.

Shortly afterward, he turned to school teaching; and in 1884, he went with the State in a part-time capacity, preparing fish for exhibit at the State Exposition.

In 1894, he became connected permanently with the State Museum, and in the following year became its director. He held this

position until 1937, when he stepped aside to permit a younger man, Harry T. Davis, take over the directorship. Mr. Brimley continued as curator.
