

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON LOAN GUARANTEES FOR VETS

Will the Veterans Administration guarantee a loan for the purchase of an automobile by a disabled veteran?

A. Yes, Disabled or not if it is essential to his business.

Q. I registered for readjustment allowances as soon as I got out of service, but got a job and did not draw any payments. Am I eligible to draw payments if I lose my job?

A. Yes. You have 5 years from the end of the war in which to use up the 52 weeks of eligibility if needed.

Q. I am going into business with my father who is not a veteran. Could a loan made jointly be guaranteed by the V A?

A. Yes, up to 50 per cent of your share. And you must be a good credit risk.

Q. As a former WAVE, am I entitled to go to a V A hospital to give birth to my baby?

A. No. Women veterans are entitled to hospitalization for disease or disabilities as are any other veteran, but it has been ruled that a normal pregnancy is neither a disease nor a disability.

OPEN FORUM

To the Editor of Duplin Times: Have you and the moron-minded Triple A leaders of Duplin County, and elsewhere, got your eyes open on the tobacco situation of the world?

I see in this week's paper what Thompson Greenwood of the Agricultural Department says. In 1935 I asked the Agricultural Department how much tobacco the world produced. They finally replied and said, "exclusive of China, 4,749,000,000 lbs. I see in your paper today that China produced in 1940, 1,131,962,000 lbs. which makes a total in the world of about 6,000,000,000 lbs. and some other countries not yet heard from.

Yet we were told by Mr. McClellan, that we had the climate, we had the labor, and we had the soil and that tobacco would not grow successfully no where except where the long-strawed pine would grow.

So in 1933 money was inflated. The value of gold was doubled. The hundred per cent dollar was reduced to fifty cents. We were told that the control of farm commodities would force prices up. Were we not told one time the truth about inflated money. And we poor little farmers fell for the slogan of farm control.

So, we lost our candy.

Instead of cur-tailing and destroying our production, we should have expanded and advertized to the world what we had; and led foreign people to believe that we had the only cigarette fit to smoke.

Had it not been for this four years' terrible war, in my opinion, we would have already been on the bottom rail.

Where we are going to from here it seems nobody knows. We should have had a billion pounds of tobacco in the past four years extra to distribute to the European smokers.

Creating a scarcity has never brought prosperity to any country.

Russia now wants a half million bales of cotton, which would mean quite a bit of money to the American cotton farmer. But the Triple A cut him down a few years ago to work on WPA jobs and fool Penderlea projects, so we will not supply Russia with our cotton.

In my way of seeing it, we, the little farmers of the South, have sold our inherited rights as free men to clear the forest and establish homes thereon by voting our privileges away.

In my opinion the little farmers of the South had better get busy and raise his hog and hominy, and he might add a little patch of rice down in a bottom somewhere and make all he can and support his family with the necessities of life.
