Surely there is a happy medium, seeing that both extremes are selfish and quite short-sighted. What to Study

We have a sad state of affairs indeed when intelligent people realize that things are taking place which they suspect are very bad for the country, yet fail to take a hand in remedying matters. Pre-serving the personal liberty of all people ought to be every man's per-sonal duty. Those who have been ty a high moral obligation.

Some men have deep learning in fields that do not embrace bistory. government or economics. Others have gained far-flung knowledge without sensing the duties of citizenship or any obligation toward other people. Curtis' long life ended be-fore this century began but he saw the political dangers of this day
