State College Meets To Homemakers

To speed up the defrosting of your refrigerator, empty the ice trays and fill with hot water. Put the trays back, turn control knob to "off" and close refrigerator.

Chocolate and cereals should be removed as soon as possible, and always before laundering. For white cottons and linens, dip the fabric up and down in hot water, wash in hot suds, bleach any remaining stains with hydrogen peroxide, and rinse well. For any washable colored fabric, wash in lukewarm suds, and use carbon tetrachloride to remove any grease spots caused by cream.

A new broom sweeps clean, and so does a clean broom. Douse it in medium-warm suds, rinse well, and hang it up by the handle to dry. Add a few drops of ammonia to the suds for a very dirty broom. When not in use, hang the broom so that the straw does not rest directly on the floor.

To preserve the garbage pail, treat it to a thorough washing with soapuds once a week followed by a hot water rinse and thorough sunning.

Use kitchen scissors to save time. Cut parsley, celery, pimento and string beans with them. Use wet scissors for dicing sticky foods such as chicken, dates and marshmallows.
