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A Letter To Tobacco Farmers:

Dear Tobacco Farmers:

We are sure you have heard over the radio and read in the papers the uncertainty as to whether Foreign Markets are going to buy much of our 1947 crop of tobacco.

With this situation staring us in our face, a number of Farmers, Warehousemen, Bankers and Business men from the flue-cured tobacco area met in Raleigh some few days ago, and decided to do something about it. Their plan is to organize an association of all the Tobacco Producers to be known as The Tobacco Associates, Inc.

This Organization will have at its head a man whom the Organization thinks knows more about our Foreign Tobacco Outlets than any other man in the world. It will be his job to work out Agreements with Foreign Nations whereby they will be able to continue to buy their share of our tobacco.

You know these people have been buying approximately one half of our production. If they should even cut down to one-fourth of our production this year, it would mean that Domestic Buyers would not have any competition to speak of and we all know what this would mean to us when we try to sell our 1947 crop this fall.

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
