Victim Bowden Wreck Dies In Goldsboro Hospital Wednesday

Funeral services were held this morning for Lewis L. Carroll of near Turkey who died in the Goldsboro Hospital Wednesday night at 10:30.

Mr. Carroll was involved in a wreck at Bowden Sunday afternoon when his car collided with one driven by a negro.

Funeral services were held at Quinn-McGowan Funeral Home, conducted by Rev. J. B. Sessions of Magnolia assisted by Rev. J. G. Morrison of Kenansville. Interment was in the family plot at the Rockfish church cemetery near Wallace.

He is survived by two brothers, Professor J. G. Carroll of Wake Forest and Joe Carroll of Aulander; two sisters, Mrs. M. E. Rice of Aulander and Mrs. W. H. Upchurch of Oxford. He was a brother of the late Mrs. K. V. Wells of Kenansville. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Washington Carroll and he resided at the old Carroll home at Reed's Ford on the Run in Sampson County. Mr. Carroll never married. He was about fifty years old.

The coroner's inquest was held Thursday afternoon and Coroner Peterson reported that the jury held Mr. Carroll's death came as a result of an automobile accident in which Roosevelt Smith, negro, driving the other car was driving at an excessive rate of speed and with improper brakes.

B. F. Grady School Annual Dedicated To The Late W. G. Kornegay

The School Annual which is now being compiled by Mrs. F. W. McGowan, a teacher in the school, will carry a picture of the late W. G. Kornegay and will be the same as that which now hangs in the school auditorium. A brief biographical sketch of him, written by a fellow public servant, A. T. Outlaw, Register of Deeds, will also appear in the Annual, following the picture, and it is substantially as follows:

WILLIAM GASTON KORNEGAY, son of Immanuel and Harriet Louisa (Kornegay) Kornegay, was born at the old Kornegay homestead in Albertson Township, Duplin County, June 20, 1867. His birthplace was in that part of said township which is now popularly known as the B. F. Grady school community and was within site of where the B. F. Grady school building now stands. He was a worthy descendant of those sturdy pioneers, known as German Palatinos, who came to America about the year 1710 and founded the town of New Berne in Craven County. George Kornegay, the first of this family in America, owned large tracts of land in Craven and Duplin Counties and the crossing over North East river in this community long known as Kornegay's bridge, bears and honors his name.

As a young man William Gaston Kornegay attended the public schools taught by B. F. Grady, R. D. Kornegay, J. F. Maxwell, and other inspired educators of that time, and in early life he became a leader in this community where he spent his entire life. He was a farmer, postmaster, merchant and public servant for many years and was active and influential in all matters affecting the public welfare. He was a member of the Democrat-
