## Governor Cherry Proclaims April As Cancer Control Month In N. C.

Citing cancer as the major health evil of current history, Governor Cherry has proclaimed April as Cancer Control Month and called on North Carolinians to raise \$168,000 to aid the American Cancer Society in its battle to bring cancer under control.

"Cancer has become a state and national disaster," Cherry said, "and its control is the great medical and health problem of today." The problem has become so serious, he added, that the U. S. Congress and North Carolina General Assembly have passed special acts designating April as Cancer Control Month.

"Cancer ranks second in the nation as a killer and destroys more than 184,000 persons a year, claiming someone's life every time the clock ticks off three minutes," he said. "The American Cancer Society with funds contributed by the public, is undertaking to teach every citizen the facts about cancer and the need for early diagnosis and treatment, to make more and better diagnostic and treatment facilities available to cancer patients, and to finance ambitious research."

The hope for conquest of cancer lies in coordinated and adequate financed research, Cherry said, as planned by the American Cancer Society.
