

The USDA's common ryegrass of 18 million pounds is being offered for immediate sale and will enable farmers to get their seed sup-ply for early planting of their winter cover crop, Joe E. Sloan, chairman of the Duplin County AAA Committee, advised this week.

The Government's early sale will give dealers an opportunity to lay in supplies for distribution and aid farmers to increase their 1947-48 plantings, Sloan said.

Seed is from the 1946 harvest and will have a total germination of 90% or better and a purity analysis of 98% or better.

Distributors interested snould contact the local AAA office for details relative to seed requirements and fair prices.

Farmers may obtain from their AAA committeemen full information regarding conservation practices payment available in connection with the planting of ryegrass for winter cover.



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
