Reserves May Enter Competition For Army Commission

The War Department has announced that commissioned officers of the Officers' Reserve Corps, National Guard, and Army of the U. S. who have reached their 21st birthday and have not exceeded their 27th birthday, in the promotion arms and services, and who are otherwise qualified, may apply for active duty for one year for the purpose of competing for a Regular Army commission.

Officers should direct their communications concerning their interest in the program to The Adjutant General, Washington 25 D. C., Attention: AGPR-D, accompanied by WD AGO Form 160 in triplicate, prior to June 15, 1947. Applications received after June 15, 1947 will not be considered and will be returned without action. These forms may be obtained by writing to Headquarters Third Army, Atlanta 3, Ga., Attention: Military Procurement Division.

Specialists Give Cattle Outlook

Cattle prices continue relatively high in spite of the fact that the number sent to market the first 4 months of the year have greatly exceeded the Government estimate made Jan. 1. This indicates that there has been but little falling off in domestic consumption of meat. Choice cattle that sold at abnormally high prices immediately following the lifting of OPA prices have declined while the medium and good grades have remained steady to slightly higher. The fact that a large percentage of cattle now in feeder's hands being finished for market are light weight would indicate that there is no surplus of mature beef being

held back. This Department strongly advises farmers to hold back thin, immature cattle until they are in marketable condition - that is, if they have pasture and feed to keep them steadily improving.
