With increased productivity, with onest hour's labor given for every hour's pay, we could see a onsiderable lowering of prices. Indeed, with genuine whole-hearted operation from labor and industry, it would be quite possible to rease output as much as 40% merally. This should be enough to bring about a general 25% reduction in prices. This could be done with our present labor force and without increased working hours.

This would in fact bring prices down until it would be equivalent to in increase in wages. This is the one sound answer to the present threat of a depression. Such answer would also give us hope of regaining foreign markets, which have had little attention paid to them ince the war.

Wisdom of a Sage

The importance of this thing rompted Bernard M. Baruch to recently that the whole postwar world would "get going only if work" and to come out for a 51/2 iny, 44 hour week. The seriousness of the problem we face is such that o may be able to save civilization we accept the challenge, Mr. ruch said, adding that this would an greater effort than that exarted during the war.

In proposing a 44 hour work week, with no strikes or layoffs to January 1, 1949," as a means of increasing production, Mr. Baruch ognized our present tendencies o put limitations on our work. He hasized that a way must be nd for production to flow smooth y.
